What Are Suicide Doors, and How Did They Earn the Name?



Suicide doors are doors that are hinged at the rear, making ingress and egress easier at the cost of the natural failsafe on normally hinged doors. Backward-hinged doors have been around as long as automobiles have had doors, for both aesthetic and practical reasons. Concerns about the safety of suicide doors (especially with the seat-belt-less vehicles of the mid-20th century) caused their decline and their morbid nickname. They've seen a recent minor resurgence, however, with both their stylistic and practical upsides gracing vehicles from Mazda to Rolls-Royce.

History of Suicide Doors - Before they were "suicide doors," they were just doors. Backward-opening doors were a common feature on early cars, directedly taken from the horse-drawn carriages that inspired motorized vehicles. Many early coachbuilt vehicles included them. When used on a sedan's rear doors, backwards-opening hinges create an architectural "double door" effect when both the front and rear doors are opened, reminiscent of large mansions. Although their look was always admired, the use of suicide doors declined after Ralph Nader targeted them along with other safety-compromising features in his 1965 book *Unsafe at Any Speed*.

Types of Suicide Doors - While the basic concept of backwards-opening doors is straightforward, there are different ways automakers and custom car builders have incorporated them. Suicide doors are most often found as the rear side doors of a vehicle, while the front doors would still open normally, such as on the Rolls-Royce Ghost. Alternatively, there are clamshell, or B-pillarless, doors. These also have the front doors hinged normally and the rear doors hinged backwards, but with the doors latching together when closed, rather than to a pillar in the center of the opening. Examples of this include the Mazda RX-8 and Honda Element. Suicide doors can also be found on coupes, lowriders, and other custom builds.

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Benefits of Suicide Doors - The main advantages of suicide doors are easier entry and exit, and graceful aesthetics. When the door is hinged backwards, a vehicle's occupant just steps forward and out, instead of having to maneuver around the door or swivel around in the seat. It's also self-evident that they look cool, enhanced by the rarity of the design.





Drawbacks of Suicide Doors - The biggest issue with suicide doors is safety, and this is the reason they're uncommon on modern vehicles. Before modern safety standards, when seat belts and effective door latches were rare, the dangers of suicide doors were more pronounced.

When opening a reverse-hinged door on a busy street, said door can turn into a beartrap if hit by a vehicle, crushing the person getting out rather than just ripping the door off. It's also much easier for an unbelted passenger to fall out, and there's the potential for a passenger who's fallen out to be dragged by the suicide door.

Installation Considerations - Installing custom suicide doors can be harder than one would think. The doors themselves need latches moved in most cases, in addition to the hinges and doorframe hardware needing to be swapped around. Installing OEM doors requires time and tuning to get a satisfactory fit, and needing aftermarket or custom fabricated parts elevates the challenge further. Just like many vertical or scissor door kits, many suicide door kits do not have the quality of the original pieces. Just like any other modification, getting it right often requires more time, effort, and money than it might seem.

Why Are They Called Suicide Doors?

Suicide doors gained their moniker through that aforementioned reputation for danger. Modern quality and technology alleviate many of those potential issues, but it's still easier to design a safe vehicle with conventional doors than one with a clamshell design that includes rear suicide doors.
